GIVE WHAT YOU CAN—TAKE WHAT YOU NEED

There is a new blessing box located in front of the Stratton Church of Christ. Anyone who would like to contribute or who is in need is welcome.

•What is a blessing box?

"A Blessing Box, sometimes also referred to as a "Little Free Pantry," is a community-supported outdoor pantry that operates on a "take what you need, leave what you can" system. This concept is similar to "little free libraries," but instead of books, they offer essential items like non-perishable food, personal care items, and toiletries."

•What can I donate?

- •Non-perishable food items: Canned goods, rice, pasta, cereal, nuts, seeds, granola bars, instant oatmeal packets, dried fruit, cake mixes, soup mixes, shelf-stable milk.
- Baby essentials: Baby food, diapers, wipes, baby formula.
- <u>Hygiene items:</u> Toilet paper, feminine products, soap, shampoo, conditioner, toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant.
- Warm clothing (in winter): Socks, mittens, hats, hand warmers, blankets.

•I'd like to donate, but the pantry is full.

If the pantry is full, items may be dropped off in the church lobby, just inside the front doors.



My eyes are sore for squinting and scratching.



Mark 9:35; And He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "If anyone desires to be first, he shall be last of and servant of all". Mark 10:45; "For even the Son of man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."

As a boy I looked forward to the 4th of July with much anticipation, because for \$4.95 enough firecrackers, silver salutes, torpedoes, Arial bombs, roman candles and rockets could be purchased to last me all day and into the evening hours. Of the men that signed the Declaration of Independence, about half were lawyers, the others were farmers and merchants, all were well educated, many had families and were considered wealthy. 
